INTRODUCTION

This document is a compilation of community objectives for trails, parks and green space. It was compiled with input from various community organizations and individuals, primarily members of the Juan de Fuca Community Trails Society. Intended as an input document to the JDFEA Parks and Recreation Commission, the document spans the communities the JDF Electoral Area communities: Willis point, Malahat, East Sooke, Otter Point, Shirley/Jordan River, Port Renfrew and the Rural Resource Lands. The document alo makes reference to the District of Sooke as many of the desired linkeages either connect to or are part of the Sooke Community Trails System. This document is the official objectives document for the Juan de Fuca Community Trails Society for trails and greenspace in the area. It is intended for the document to be updated on an annual basis. Objectives can be added at any time by majority vote of the directors at a director's meeing.

Where the terminology "acquire is used" this does not imply acquisition of the land or right of way by the Society. It means acquisition of the land or right to use the trail, park or greenspace by the public by whichever legal means is applicable. This can mean acquisition by the CRD for public purpose, acquisition of permission to use by the Society or other organization.

It is recognized that some of the identified lands may be part of First Nations treaty negotiations. Inclusion here is an expression of general community interest and is not meant to prejudice treaty negotiation. Where possible, partnerships and cooperation between community groups are encouraged.

Item numbers refer to associated map references. Co-ordinates are given are in UTM (10N) coordinates. Coordinates are approximate to help in the location function of the CRD Natural Area Atlas. Where applicable, start and end points of a trail are represented, not the detailed route which is to be determined, in most cases.
